From Pastor Doane...

Which would you choose:

A banquet where you enjoy the most delicious dishes and desserts with cranky, cantankerous guests? Or, a piece of dry toast and bowl of broth eaten with a dear friend?

Solomon, who – being a king – certainly ate more than anyone's fair share of extravagant feasts, knew what he liked. In his book of wise sayings, he wrote;

"Better a dry crust with peace and quiet than a house full of feasting, with strife" (Proverbs 17:1, NIV).

Or, you can read it;

"A meal of bread and water in contented peace is better than a banquet spiced with quarrels" (the Message).

Those aren't the only possibilities. In the worst case, you could find yourself with nothing more than a crust of bread in the company of nasty people. Or, in the best case, it could be a marvelous feast with really nice people and great conversation.

But, I think you get Solomon's point. It isn't really about the gourmet food in a glitzy setting. Nor is it about tasteless grub in a dive.

It's really about the companionship, the fellowship, the relationships. We were created to enjoy such, but it got messed up very near the beginning with a lying snake, a piece of forbidden fruit, and two people willing to believe their Creator wanted to deprive them of the good stuff.

But the Lord's re-creating work in us aims to restore what was given up in Eden. And by His Spirit at work in us we can find the most pleasing companionship, unity, and fellowship.

Bible passages read in worship this past Sunday (Colossians 3) and this coming Sunday (Ephesians 5) get at this.

Since by a new relationship with Christ Jesus we "put on the new self, which is being renewed in knowledge in the image of its Creator," we let "the peace of Christ rule in [our] hearts, since as members of one body [we are] called to peace." So then, we "let the message of Christ dwell among [us] richly" and we harmonize and testify with "psalms, hymns, and songs from the Spirit" (Col. 3:10, 15, 16). Read Eph. 5 to see teaching that compliments Col. 3.

Since, as the Bible says, the Lord's Word is like fine steak and sweet dessert, you can enjoy very good feasting while you dine on His instructions and promises.

They say, "We are what we eat." So, join us at church to enjoy tasting God's Word in the fellowship of good company. And, like you don't eat one meal a week, dig in and digest the Scriptures every day to grow healthy and strong.
