From Pastor Doane...

"I've worked hard to be the humble man I am. And I'm quite proud of that."

The friend who said that, said it with a sly grin.

There are some ways the Bible does urge us to have some pride.

"In God we make our boast all day long, and we will praise your name forever." (Psalm 44:8)

"If you want to boast, boast only about the Lord." (1 Corinthians 1:31)

"Each one should test their own actions. Then they can take pride in themselves alone, without comparing themselves to someone else..." (Galatians 6:4-5)

So, there is a kind of godly satisfaction and exulting. It is godly because the one feeling it recognizes the real source of everything good.

So, why should we care about being humble? Well, the Bible does say plenty about ways "God opposes the proud but shows favor to the humble." (James 4:6)

Just a couple sentences later, James counsels; "Humble yourselves before the Lord, and he will lift you up" (James 4:10, NIV). That will be our February verse of

biblical wisdom, but said this way; "Be humble as you live before the Lord, and He will honor you."

James does not mean we must be humble just when we're aware the Lord is present. When are we <u>not</u> in His presence? The Lord is not the only audience to witness our humility. A courteous, modest, unpretentious spirit is to describe our lifestyle.

But we all came into this world with a natural inclination to inflate our own ego and assert our self-importance. That pride was Satan's original sin; "I will raise my throne above the stars of God; I will sit enthroned on the mount of assembly, on the utmost heights." (Isaiah 14:13)

Such pride was the devil's tactic to entice the first human sin. It has plagued us ever since. That's in Genesis 3:5; "the tree's fruit was good to eat, pleasing to look at, and would make a person wise, like God." Compare that with 1 John 2:16;

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"good to eat" / the "lust of the flesh"
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"pleasing to look at" / "the lust of the eyes"

"make wise like God" / "the boastful pride of life"

It might be useful to examine; How much of my thinking is about how I can elevate other's thoughts of me? How often do my words aim to reinforce my superiority? How often are my actions and deeds done to raise other people's esteem for me?

If that's your aim, you may well succeed. But consider the cost. So that God can honor you, He will have to humble you. Instead, make it your priority to be humble, and God will lift you up. *His* high esteem is what you want.
